

Magda successfully battled lymphoma for over 13 years, only to be diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia in July 2014. She and her family were grateful for the wonderful care she received from Dr. Donna Cuthbert, Dr. Brian Winsby and Dr. Jeffrey Schulz. Your Cat's Health: Ask the Vets at Cornell University

Q. Our cat, Mugs, weighs 26 pounds. He has eaten nothing but diet cat food for two years and has gained four pounds! What can we do to help our large boy? He is an indoor cat.

A. Nutritionists are not certain of the causes of obesity in cats but suspect that genetics play a role, as do behavior and lifestyle. Unfortunately, the energy expenditure of most indoor cats is less than their fuel intake. Obese cats have a higher incidence of diseases such as diabetes mellitus and suffer from more conditions like arthritis. Your veterinarian can help you determine the ideal weight for Mugs, and then two steps are required: **1.** strict calorie controlled diet and **2.** more exercise. Your vet can help you determine the ideal calorie intake for weight

control and weight loss, so offer that amount and no more, with no between meal snacks or people food. You can figure out the caloric content of his food by calling the manufacturer if the information is not listed on the can. Movement can be encouraged by putting Mugs' food or favourite cushion in a place where he must move or jump or climb to reach them. More play time should be added to his day. Get a toy or an item that he likes to chase, and get him moving!



My Search for The PERFECT Cat by CRC Member Denis Brisson



I want the perfect cat. One that is fun to play with, one that loves to snuggle with me, is soft and has nice fur, is the perfect breed, and I can be proud to say is my cat. If you talk to any cat owner they will laugh at you, saying there is no such thing as the perfect cat.

Their cat does things that defy understanding, will follow them everywhere but don't want to be touched, hide for the first two weeks you own them, then only come out late at night for food and the litter box. Oh, did I mention owned??? That's right... YOU are owned by your cat/s. You do not own them! You are there to see to all their needs, not the other way around! When you get a cat, YOU ARE THEIRS!!!

But I don't want one of THOSE cats! I want a GOOD cat! I want a GREAT cat! I want the PERFECT cat!!!

Well, you MAY want a perfect cat but every cat will have a personality, and as that personality comes out, some traits will appear. It is up to you and your vet to get the good traits to stay, and the not so good traits to not come up as often, or not at all, by training the cat. Your vet will often have advice that will help ease the stresses the cat is undergoing. There may even be a medical issue that is causing a problem.

Scratching is one that is often heard of, and the meme I have seen most often is a picture of a cat, beside a destroyed item, with the line beside it saying, "This is the reason we can't have nice stuff.". Covering something that cats start scratching at with foil makes it less nice to scratch, but you have to have something they CAN scratch beside it so they have something to scratch. Cats may like both horizontal, and/or vertical scratching posts.

If your car scratches around in the litter box then steps out of the box and hasn't urinated or urinates beside the box or runs to you and urinates, that is a sign that they might have a UTI, a urinary tract infection, and need veterinary medical help. Or they may find the box just stinks and can't stay in long enough to do their thing. Cats have a great sense of smell, so if you can smell it, imagine how it stinks to them!

Cats are really not fans of change of any type. Change their type of food, litter brand, or location of the litter box, different people in the home, or a different home, and they may become stressed. This may come out in various ways, such as vomiting, hiding, licking off all the accessible fur, and defecating in different spots.

Many of the people who foster rescue cats send along a blanket the cat slept on to give it something familiar to go to, when it feels stressed on arrival in a new home. They may recommend a type of cat food and litter to make the cat feel more comfortable so that there is less stress about the new home. Some people might also adopt a brother or sister of their new cat so they have a familial scent and a friend close by to snuggle with.

So what is the perfect cat? That would be the cat that loves you unconditionally, and that you love back the same way! Now THAT is the perfect cat! By Denis Brisson
