Protect India's Wildlife from Open Wells

Wildlife S.O.S. is an animal rescue organization in India. They have an Elephant Sanctuary near Agra, and also rescue Sloth Bears that were previously used as dancing street bears. They also help to provide alternate means of income for the previous owners of the bears. A terrible problem in India is the abundance of open wells. Recently in Maharashtra, India, Wildlife S.O.S. rescued a pregnant leopard from a 40 feet deep well in a village. She unfortunately passed away due to severe stress and internal bleeding. This incident highlights the urgent need to cover open wells in India before more lives are lost. 

Lions face same threats as extinct Ice Age cats

The African lion formerly ranged throughout Eurasia and Africa, but today is only found in sub-Saharan Africa. Two big cats—the African lion and the Sunda clouded leopard, are most at risk from extinction caused by loss of prey, according to a new analysis. Lack of food was a factor in why seven big cats, including sabre-toothed tigers, went extinct at the end of the last Ice Age, say scientists. They warn that the trend is continuing, threatening a range of modern big cats. If the prey of big cats continues to decline it will add to other pressures

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such as habitat loss. Dr. Chris Sandom from the University of Sussex said "I think it adds an extra pressure for these animals. They are already suffering quite heavily from other conflicts with humans." He said the lesson from the past was that even if Ice Age big cats had survived conflicts with humans and changing climates, they would not have had much left to eat. "We're in a continued decline of big, exciting animals," he added. "These charismatic predators are facing this consistent threat that started in the Ice Age and continues to this day and we need to turn this trend around."

The research, led by scientists at Sussex and Oxford Universities, looked at the causes of extinction of seven big cats. They found that if the animals had survived until modern times they would have lost the majority of their prey party due to human influences. They then turned their attention to modern big cats, and the status of their prey. If all the prey species currently considered at risk were to go extinct, the lions of East Africa and the clouded leopards of Indo-Malaysia would be in a similar position to their Ice Age relatives. Professor David Macdonald of Oxford University's Wildlife Conservation Unit said: "The Churchillian aphorism that **those that fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it** was painfully in mind when we saw how many of the prey of East African lions and clouded leopards look set to go down the same drain which their counterparts in other regions have already been flushed."

Your Cat's Health: Ask the Vets at Cornell University

Q. We have a 6 year old indoor/outdoor cat who is in good health. Should I worry about heartworms? My friend's dog is infected.

A. Our first thought is that your cat should ideally be a totally indoor cat, although this would not preclude potential exposure to heartworms. Recent studies showed that 25% of cats infected with heartworms were considered indoor cats. Feline heartworm infection is less common than its canine counterpart, but it has been reported in all 50 American states. The organism is transmitted by mosquitoes, which ingest the L1 larval stage. By the time it reaches stage 3 it can be transmitted to another animal, and at stage 5 (7 or 8 months after initial bite) it matures and migrates through the tissues of a cat and arrives in the heart and blood vessels of the lung. Mature heartworms can cause significant damage to the pulmonary arteries and to the lungs themselves. Although cats seems to be more resistant to heartworm infection than dogs, it can be life threatening in some cats. Treatment can be problematic, and there is no evidence that any therapy targeted at killing the adult worms increases the survival of cats, unlike in dogs. For this reason, heartworm prevention is important in cats. The American Heartworm Society FELINE HEA CORNEL, recommends monthly prophylaxis against heartworm in cats, even if they are indoor pets. It is recommended that

you discuss these options with your vet.


