## **News From our Foster/Adoption Program**



A tribute to one of our beloved foster cats, written by Kim Esau, the co-ordinator of our Foster/Adoption Program.

Rags came into the care of CRC in 2011 when he was rescued as a malnourished stray who was near death. Rags had many ongoing struggles to regain his health, one of which was kidney disease. Because he was elderly and needed significant medical care, we made the decision to have Rags become a permanent foster cat.

He was also extremely needy and wanted to be near you

constantly. Rags was a very gentle soul who touched many hearts along the way. He was matched with the perfect foster home! He spent almost five years being doted on and given all the love and attention any cat would dream of. His foster mom was retired, with a deep love for cats. Rags wanted someone home a lot. She was able to attend to his medical needs and administer several daily medications. She loved Rags, and Rags loved her. While he had clearly spent many years neglected and struggling for survival, the last years of his life were full of love and care.



#### GiGi's First Vacation by Pam Slyth



In April of this year, our indomitable cat Gigi had her 19<sup>th</sup> birthday. After many years of faithful companionship to our daughter, who was six when Gigi arrived, we celebrated with a rendition of Happy Birthday and a nice tuna treat.

Gigi displays the usual characteristics of a senior cat; she sleeps a lot, demands a lot of attention, and is visibly slowing down. She is deaf, but her senses of smell and eyesight have not failed; the smell or sight of a can of tuna opening can bring her running at a kittenish pace. She has gracefully accepted her special renal diet (for now anyway) but an occasional treat is always welcome.

This summer, due to a lack of organization on my part, and the unavailability of suitable pet sitters, we found ourselves ready to head out to the cabin for two weeks, with no plan for Gigi. A boarding kennel: too stressful. An occasional drop in by friends: too lonely. So we made the last minute decision to take Gigi to the cabin for the first time. Despite several worries expressed by friends and complete strangers who either said we had lost our minds, or that the cat would escape, be eaten by an eagle, or keep us up all night, we persevered. After all, the cabin is not far away and we could be home again in less than two hours to make other plans if any of their dire predictions came true.

We advised her to make a packing list: her favourite blanket, basket, heating pad, special diet, and cat kennel were duly packed and she was ready to go. Certainly as much stuff as when travelling with a toddler!

First stop was cabin #10, which is just big enough for our daughter and Gigi, with a covered and gated deck looking right out onto the ocean and the dock. Signs were posted to warn dog owners of the presence of a cat. Much to our surprise, GiGi settled right in, happy that her heating pad and her human companion were close at hand. Every morning she sat, supervised, on the railing of the deck watching the seabirds and the boats going by. She could often be seen inside, sitting on the windowsill, carefully open only a few inches, watching people walk by and taking long deep sniffs of sea air with her nose up against the crack.

At the end of the first week, a move was necessary to cabin #3. Again GiGi settled in quickly and was waiting eagerly every morning for her outing to the deck to check out the wildlife. She was taken for little walks on a leash, and happily slept most of the day in a sunbeam.

So the vacation was a great success. GiGi seemed to enjoy it and our daughter was free of stress because her cat was at hand. At the end of the vacation, GiGi threw a toddler-like tantrum, unhappy to be home, and refused to leave her basket for two days. It was breakfast in bed until she forgave us. We are optimistic that she will be with us at the cabin to celebrate her 20th year.







## Five Tips for Travel with Your Cat- from CatWatch September 2018

For cats who must travel with you, (such as GiGi's story on page 3), please consider these safety tips from Cornell University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

- 1. **Restraint and Identification.** Especially if you are travelling by public transportation or car, choose a safe crate that will both confine and protect your cat in case of a crash. Consider a collar, tags or microchipping to identify your pet.
- 2. **Consider sedation or other means of calming if your cat is not a happy traveler.**This may mean a prescription medication from your vet, or simply using a pet pheromone or aromatherapy designed for cats. Always discuss these options with your vet before trying them.
- 3. **Plan on packing food and water for your cat**. Cats do best with their usual routine and normal diet. Add in an extra day or two of food, in case of delays.
- 4. **Routine is important.** Try to keep your cat's normal schedule as much as possible. That means mealtimes at the usual time, with plenty of time to use the litter box. Remember that cat's don't understand time-zone changes, so you may need to adjust for that.
- 5. **Be realistic**. Most cats prefer to stay at home with a pet sitter instead of gallivanting across the country. That said, there are adventure loving cats (the Editor has friends whose cat loves travelling in their RV, and considers it their second home), and if that describes your cat, be prepared to ensure their safety while away from home.



## Your Cat's Health: Ask the Vets at Cornell University

Q: Occasionally my cat's eyes water for no reason. They clear up on their own, but I am wondering if I should get her checked at the vet.

A: Eye discharge is common in cats and may have a simple cause, or indicate a serious disease. You would be wise to get your cat checked. Young cats are especially susceptible to a variety of upper-respiratory infections, both viral and bacterial. Cats who are affected may experience chronic, intermittent discharge from the eyes, even if they don't display other symptoms. Vaccines can decrease the chance of infection, and the severity of the disease. Discharge from both eyes may suggest a systemic problem such as a viral infection, while discharge from one eye could mean a blocked duct or a foreign body such as plant material lodged in the eye. Allergies can also cause ocular discharge in cats.

Any indication of pain, squinting, or pawing the region around the eye should be addressed immediately: these signs may indicate corneal ulceration and/or glaucoma.
